Hereby we send you the third newsletter in which we inform you about the events of the past three months. But first the following:

Do you know what we stand for and what our goal is?

Thai and foreign volunteers on location take care of hundreds of street dogs on a daily basis and as a foundation we try to support these people. With the help of the local vets, animals are being sterilized and receive necessary medical care.

Our goal is to reduce the population of street dogs and cats in Hua Hin by sterilizing them and to relieve them from pain, itching and hunger. If possible we look for new homes for puppies and adult dogs and cats in Thailand and abroad.

Superman!

Marlie Timmermans found Superman in Hua Hin Thailand at the end of February. There were two large tumors on his back leg and he had the Papilloma virus. He had surgery twice and was sterilized. On April 10th Superman was able to leave the clinic and was brought to the shelter of "David Soy Slack" in Korat Thailand. A Canadian man who takes care of over more than 50 street dogs and cats in and around his home. There is a large meadow with a pond available for the dogs to run free. So Superman found his spot.

By this time five street cats that were wandering on a compound in Hua Hin are sterilized. Still dozens to go and we can only make that happen when we keep receiving donations.

These five cats are taken care of by volunteer Jacqueline and her husband Ronald.

And then there is Ponpon. A bloodtest showed he has AIDS. He is been taken care of by Elsy, a Belgian lady who lives at the compound.

Two dogs saved out of a yard of an uninhabited house.

Two dogs were left behind in an enclosed garden of an uninhabited house in Hua Hin Thailand. Fortunately Thai volunteer Khun Nueng noticed them. One of the dogs was in very bad shape. It took Khun Nueng a lot of effort to get the dogs out of the garden. She then brought them to the vet. The white and tan dog named "KaoKea" weighed only 8,5 kg and a lot of organs were about to fail. The tan dog "Noname" was released from the clinic and adopted, after medical attention, sterilization and extra food.

After fighting for his life for two months KaoKea died.

Blonde en O'Boy were found by our Swedish volunteer Linda. Linda took care of this scared mother and puppy on a daily basis. It took weeks but finally Blonde trusts Linda and Blonde was sterilized. Linda also adopted O'Boy! Today O'Boy is 6 months old and becoming a big boy. Blonde is back at her spot on the street and is doing very fine. Linda still takes care of her every day.

Every day Dutch volunteer Miek (Mikey) takes care of this amazing pack of 8 in front of her house at Soi 92. Because of donations we were able to sterilize and vaccinate all of them! Also, they receive medicine against fleas and parasites that cause (skin) diseases, on a monthly basis. The dogs show their gratitude by guarding Miek's house; we can think of no better alarm system. 😊



The dogs from Soi 88 and 94

Over twenty dogs from Soi 88 and 94 are waiting to be sterilized. Some of them are very scared, including the dog below, Tammy. Tammy had a bad skin disease but Linda managed to give her medicine in a sausage. In the middle picture below you can see the result. Her skin has healed and her fur is back.



Unfortunately Tammy was hit by a car in the beginning of June. An infection on her paw and a swollen belly are the results. She had to be darted as no one was able to get close to her. As the anesthesia did its work the vet examined Tammy. Nothing seemed to be broken but she did have some internal bruises. She also had blood parasites, which are caused by fleas and ticks. As soon as she is stable, Tammy will be sterilized and returned to her pack where Linda will take care of her.

Other than Tammy we darted another scared dog. She is already sterilized and returned to her pack.

One sterilization costs 50 euros, costs for staying at the vet are not included.

Noa lay in the middle of a crossroad in the pouring rain. Jacqueline recognized her and knew she is being fed by the nuns at the temple.

At the clinic an X-ray was taken of her which showed her leg was broken and an operation is necessary.

Noa also will be sterilized. We hope she will recover soon so she can return to the nuns at the temple.
